AGING CARE CONNECTIONS PRESENTS AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE

This past February, two Aging Care Connections' staff members attended the 2011 Administration on Aging (AoA), Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, VA National Grantee Meeting in Baltimore, Maryland. The meeting provided an opportunity for grantees from across the nation focusing on transitional care to collaborate and learn from one another to continue to create holistic approaches to transitional care.

Last fall, Aging Care Connections, in partnership with the Illinois Department on Aging, Illinois Transitional Care Consortium (ITCC), AgeOptions, and the Progress Center for Independent Living (PCIL) received a two year AoA grant for the Bridge Care Transitions Project, a social work-based transitional care service model that ensures the safe transition of older adults and their caregivers across the healthcare system and promotes successful reintegration to the community.

Louise Starmann, Director of Social Services, and Ilana Shure, Aging Resource Center Manager, were both invited to present on two unique projects developed at

Aging Care Connections. Ilana Shure co-presented the Bridge Model with fellow ITCC member Walter Rosenberg. The Bridge Model developed and implemented at the Aging Care Connections Aging Resource Center in collaboration with ITCC is one of sixteen nationally-recognized, evidence-based transitional care models.

In addition to this presentation, Louise Starmann spoke to fellow grantees from across the nation on the "Cheerios" Program developed by Aging Care Connections in partnership with The British Home. "Cheerios" is an innovative program providing specialized home delivered meals to older adults with sensitive diets such as low salt, diabetic, vitamin K diet, diverticulitis diet, mechanical soft, and pureed. Louise and other experts from across the country shared effective partnership approaches to overcoming service barriers in transitional care.

As a result of the conference, Aging Care Connections has received countless inquiries from fellow meeting attendees looking to replicate the innovative resources provided by Aging Care Connections.

Title III Chore is a program through which we hire, schedule and manage choreworkers to provide light housekeeping services to clients. Title III Chore is provided on a need basis, and there are no financial eligibility requirements.

As the years passed and family responsibilities grew, Jennifer has become a part-time employee. Her caseload has been scaled back and she now has assistance with the Chore Program. She supervises the Community Care Program (CCP) which entails reviewing the files and doing

the billings for the assessments. CCP is a state-subsidized program which covers the cost of non-medical homemakers, emergency response systems, and adult day care for our clients who are financially eligible and assessed to be in need of the program.

Jennifer enjoys spending time with her family, husband, Jeff, and their three children, Nicholas, 8, Emily, 4, and Joey, 1. When time allows, she also enjoys reading, watching movies, and being outdoors.

BENEFITS ASSISTANCE

Aging Care Connections is working with AgeOptions, the Area Agency on Aging of suburban Cook County, to identify older adults who may not be aware of supplemental Medicare assistance programs. These programs fall under the Medicaid program. **MEDICAID IS A JOINTLY FUNDED FEDERAL AND STATE PROGRAM THAT COVERS MEDICAL EXPENSES FOR LOW INCOME AND LOW ASSET PERSONS WHO ARE:**

Aged 65+, blind, or disabled residents of Illinois and US citizens or qualified immigrants.

Limited income individuals with Medicare may be eligible for help to pay Medicare expenses through the Medicare Savings Programs (MSP)

There are three levels of assistance. QMB offers assistance with the cost of the Part B Medicare premium and covers deductibles and coinsurance. SLIB pays the monthly Part B premiums and QI-1 also assists with Medicare Part B premiums.

Each of these programs has income and asset limitations that will dictate the level of support received from Medicaid. This article is designed as only a brief overview of the programs available; our benefits

counselors are available to assist with applications and more individualized assistance. We do know that lack of information and preconceived notions about benefit programs prevent older adults from seeking these types of programs. If you are an individual with less than \$12,640 in assets and an income of less than \$1,361 per month, or a couple with less than \$25,260 in assets and an income of less than \$1,654 per month, this is a program you should investigate.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program – SNAP (formerly Food Stamps) has also changed significantly. Individuals with household incomes of less than \$1,805 gross monthly income may be eligible to receive SNAP assistance. The change in eligibility is that assets are no longer counted in determining eligibility.

Appointments are required for application and consultation. We also offer the Benefits Check-up, or BCU, that can be mailed or picked up at Aging Care Connections. This tool provides a comprehensive screening for all state and federal programs. Please contact Aging Care Connections for information on these programs by calling 708-354-1323.

Caregiver Support Series

Aging Care Connections will be offering a five-week series of classes for caregivers who are taking care of dementia patients in the later stages. This will be an educational-support group facilitated by a social work intern and other professionals from Adventist St. Thomas Hospice. The group will begin in April. DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO HAS RECENTLY BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH DEMENTIA?

EARLY STAGE MEMORY LOSS CLASS FORMING

Aging Care Connections is currently forming a new series of classes for our popular Early Stage Memory Loss program. This is an eight-session series of classes specifically for older adults and family members to learn about memory loss from the perspective of treatment and planning. The classes focus on topics of how to discuss the diagnosis with friends and family, making plans for the future, exercise and treatment. Many older adults with a new diagnosis of dementia can become depressed and anxious about the future; the purpose of this series is about living well and adapting in a positive way.
